The twelfth edition of the New York African Film Festival will showcase 24 films from 12 countries, including a number whose national cinema are mostly unknown to US audiences, such as Niger, Zimbabwe, Rwanda, Angola and Mozambique. The program will open with the US Premiere of the award winning film Forgiveness a moving testament to the cathartic rebirth of those who survived the cruel tragedies of apartheid.

AFF will take a close look at the construction of "Race in the Continent's Diaspora" with a focus on race formation in South Africa. Several of the films in this year's festival address the categorization of Coloreds in the Diaspora while redefining what race relations mean in today's increasingly globalized world.

The wealth and beauty of African filmmaking is drawn from the unique and rich tradition of African storytelling. This year's "A Peek Behind the Camera" program will look at the legacy of the Griot culture, and the art of storytelling with and without the tool of the camera, and its subsequent effects on a culture.

AFF is proud to present a mid-career retrospective of **Pierre Yameogo**, one of the most popular African filmmakers from Burkina Faso whose films are known for their direct approach to African reality. "Father of African Cinema," Ousmane Sembene will also be present to introduce his critically acclaimed film *Moolaade* as well as the short documentary *Making of Moolaade*.

Our collaboration with Columbia University School of the Arts continues with a special screening of Keita: The Heritage of the Griot starring Sotegui Kouyate, at the Walter Reade Theater. Mr. Kouyate will introduce the film and lead a post-screening discussion with the audience.

Branwen Oknako

Nigeria/Germany, 2000, 75 min.

This documentary tries to find out how the former East Germany's first black cop and posterboy for diversity ends up becoming a criminal serving a ten-year jail sentence.

Forgiveness

South Africa, 2004, 115 min.

Tertius Coetzee, an ex-cop granted amnesty for his crimes by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, seeks out the family of one of his apartheid-era victims to ask them for forgiveness. His decision to visit the family results in heated emotions, unexpected twists, and an ending that will have a lasting impression

For the Night / Pour La Nuit

Isabelle Boni-Claverie

France/Ivory Coast, 2004 20 min. On the eve of her mother's funeral and on the night before his wedding day, both Muriel and Sam try to find comfort in the face of monumental changes, even if that comfort only lasts "For the Night."

The Hero / O Heroi

Zeze Gamboa

Angola/ Portugal/ France, 2004, 97 min. Vitorio, a 35-year-old soldier and homeless veteran of the Angolan civil war is robbed of his prosthetic leg and his war medal and embarks on a mission to get a replacement. Gamboa's film is a subtle exploration of the tormented social and economic political situation of a country ravaged by 27 years of war.


Keepers of Memory / Gardiens de la Mémoire Eric Kabera,

Kounandi

Burkina Faso, 2003, 49 min.

Orphaned and rejected by her village for being a dwarf, Kounandi falls in love with Karim, a kindhearted man who aids her. However, he is already married...

Kuxa Kanema

Margarida Cardoso

Mozambique, 2003, 53 min.

Award-winning filmmaker Margarida Cardoso presents us with the collapsing national ideal of "one cinema for the people" and the dreams of people who believed that one day Mozambique would become a different country.

Laafi

Burkina Faso, 1990, 85 min

A refreshing look at a side of African life rarely found on the screen, Yameogo sets a metropolitan odyssey against the leisure of life in a rural hometown. Laafi was awarded top prize at the 1991 Festival of Pan-African Cinema at Ouagadougou.

Madame Brouette / Mrs. Wheelbarrow

Moussa Sene Absa Senegal, 2002, 104 min.

Sene Absa employs a storytelling style that mixes an age-old chorus of tribal griots with modern sensationalist newscasters to recount a loopy saga of passion, ambition, chauvinism, corruption, gangsters and betrayal, African-style, in the most colorful case of playa-hating since "Chicago.'

The Making of Moolaadé

Samba Gadjigo

Senegal, 2004, 20 min

As somebody says in this short documentary "making a film in Africa is an adventure". The shooting of Moolaade took place in a small remote village in Burkina Faso and brought together a diverse group of people who contributed to the success of Sembene's latest

Me and My White Pal / Moi et Mon Blanc

Pierre Yameogo

Burkina Faso/France, 2003, 90 min When Mamandi, a stuggling student, discovers a stash of drugs, his friend convinces him their problems are over. However, evading the dealers is tougher than they expect. This light-hearted satire was Winner of the RFI Audience Award at FESPACO in 2003.

Moolaadé

Ousmane Sembene Senegal, 2004, 124 min.

A rousing film directed against the still-common African practice of female circumcision. Set in a small village, Collé, a strong-willed woman protects four girls facing ritual "purification." Tension mounts as the ensuing stand-off pits Collé against village traditionalists (both males & females), endangering the prospective marriage of her daughter to the heir-apparent to the tribal

Mother's Day / Kare Kare Zvako

Tsitsi Dangerembga

Zimbabwe, 2004, 30 min

Drought has struck. Father pushes his wife away from the family dinner of termites. When mother challenges him, he digs a pit with a brutal purpose. Based on an old Shona folk tale and rendered as a musical celebrating a diversity of contemporary Zimbabwean music.

Silmande

Pierre Yameogo

Burkina Faso, 1998, 85 min In this modern dramatic comedy, a Lebanese family who took refuge in Africa has become prosperous. The battles for influence amongst the Europeans, Lebanese, and Africans, the shady deals required to stay afloat, the hidden traffic, the love affairs and dreams of going back

home punctuate this complex city life.

Soldiers of the Rock

Norman Maake

South Africa, 2003, 94 min. To experience the world in which his father died, Vuyo decides to take a break from business studies and joins a jaded, well-muscled crew of deep level miners.

Story of a Beautiful Country

Khalo Matabane

South Africa / Canada, 2004, 73 min The journey of Khalo Matabane, a young black filmmaker in search of his "promised land," serves as an open forum for ordinary people to talk about their feelings and impressions of the new South Africa.

A South African Love Story -Walter and Albertina Sisulu

Toni Strasburg

South Africa, 2004, 63 min A touching exploration of one of South Africa's most celebrated couples, showing the deep personal cost that brought South Africa to its current triumphant harmony.

Waiting for Valdez

Dumisani Phakathi South Africa, 2002, 26 min

Despite hardships, it is the love of Sharky's grandmother which helps him through a life devoid of parental guidance and the tumultuous political period of the 1970s, when apartheid forcibly removed blacks and coloureds to different parts of Johannesburg.

Wendemi

Pierre Yameogo

Burkina Faso, 1992, 93 min.

Twenty years ago Wendemi was abandoned by his unwed mother. Now grown up, Wendemi has fallen in love and wants to get married, so he decides to travel to the capital where he hopes to find his mother, who alone can tell him the truth about his birth.

The Wound / La Blessure
